MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

**GVPT REMEMBERS
RICHARD PIERRE CLAUDE**



On Thursday, March 17, 2011 Professor Emeritus Richard Claude lost his battle to pancreatic cancer. Richard retired from the Department of Government and Politics at the University of Maryland, College Park in 1993.

Professor Claude was the Founding Editor of Human Rights Quarterly (Johns Hopkins University Press) and author of Educating for Human Rights: The Philippines and Beyond (University of Hawaii Press, 1997). Professor Claude is the co-editor of several books published by the University of Pennsylvania Press: Human Rights and Statistics: Getting The Record Straight (1991); Human Rights in the World Community (1992); Human Rights Education for the 21st Century (1997); Science in the Service of Human Rights (2002) a volume in the Pennsylvania Studies in Human Rights series which was named Best Book in Human Rights for 2003 by the American Political Science Association.

A scholar, educator, and writer, Professor Claude dedicated his career to the establishment of international standards for human rights, and the establishment of international watchdog activities to ensure the fairness of elections around the new democracies of the world. Inspired by Albert Einstein and others, he believed that the education of young scientists and health professionals should be bound by a social contract that safeguards their freedom to travel, associate, and communicate freely agreeing that they do no harm and direct their talents toward caring for all human beings and the earth we inhabit. In 2009, Professor Claude was honored at an AAAS Science and Human Rights Coalition meeting as a founding father of efforts to get scientists to take up important work on human rights around the globe. "Among his major interests were the establishment of international standards for human rights, and the establishment of international watchdog activities to ensure the fairness of elections around the new democracies of the world."

A Memorial Mass will be held at Holy Trinity Church, 36th and O Sts., NW on Monday, April 4 at 11 a.m., with a reception to follow. Interment Arlington National Cemetery at a later date. James Morrow who will serve as the Chair for the External Review Committee, received his Ph.D. in 1982 at the University of Rochester. He is Professor at the Department of Political Science at the University of Michigan - Ann Arbor whose department ranked #4 in the 2009 *U.S. News and World Report* rankings and is ranked #4 in the 1993 National Research Council (NRC) rankings. Co-author of *The Logic of Political Survival*, and Author of *Game Theory for Political Scientists*. He has also published 30 articles in refereed journals such as *World Politics*, *International Organization*, *American Political Science Review*, *Journal of Peace Research*, *Journal of Conflict Resolution*, *International Studies Quarterly* among others. Professor Morrow's research addresses theories of international politics, both the logical development and empirical testing of such theories. He is best known for pioneering the application of noncooperative game theory, drawn from economics, to international politics. His published work covers crisis bargaining, the causes of war, military alliances, arms races, power transition theory, links between international trade and conflict, the role of international institutions, and domestic politics and foreign policy. Professor Morrow received the Karl Deutsch Award from the International Studies Association in 1994. He is a member of the editorial boards of the *American Political Science Review*, *International Organization*, *Journal of Conflict Resolution*, *Journal of Politics*, *International Studies Quarterly*, *Journal of Theoretical Politics*, and *Economics of Governance*. He served on the National Science Foundation Advisory Panel for Political Science from 1995-1997.

Paula D. McClain is professor of political science and law and director of the Ralph Bunche Institute at Duke University whose political science department is tied at #9 in the 2009 *U.S. World and News Report* and ranked #14 in the 1993 NRC Rankings. She specializes in American politics with an emphasis on race and politics, urban politics, and public policy and has published extensively in these areas. Her most recent book, coauthored with Joseph Stewart, Jr, *Can We all Get Along? Racial and Ethnic Minorities in American Politics*, was published by Westview Press (initially published in 1995, second edition 1998, s second edition update 1999). It won the 1996 Gustavus Myers Center Award for one of the best books on intolerance in North America. Her other books include *Race, Place, and Risk: Black Homicide in Urban America*, SUNY Press, 1990. She is a past-vice president of the American Political Science Association, a past president of the National Conference of Black Political Scientists, served as program co-chair for the 1993 annual meeting of the American Political Science Association, and program chair for the 1999 annual meeting of the Midwest Political Science Association.

Thomas M. Carsey is the Thomas J. Pearsall Distinguished Professor of Political Science at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill whose political science department is tied for 13th in the 2009 *U.S. News and World Report* rankings and is ranked #18 in the 1993 National Research Council (NRC) rankings. Professor Carsey's research interests focus on representation in national and sub national politics in the U.S. More specifically, he studies electoral behavior, campaigns, political parties, and legislatures in the American context. He is particularly interested in how contextual factors such as campaign information, demography, or institutions shape political attitudes and behavior. Professor Carsey also has a strong interest in quantitative methods. Professor Carsey has published two books: *Congress and the Distributive Politics of Military Procurement*, University of Oklahoma Press, 2002 with Barry Rundquist and *Campaign Dynamics: The Race for Governor*, University of Michigan Press, 2000. He also has many articles published (or forthcoming) in top journals such as the *American Political Science Review*, the *American Journal of Political Science*, *Electoral Studies*, *Political Behavior and Journal of Politics*. Professor Carsey has received numerous research grants from the National Science Foundation, and he will be assuming the editorship of *State Politics and Policy Quarterly*—the leading journal in the area of state politics—in June 2010.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF GRADUATE STUDIES

We have distributed funding letters, and as was the case last year, we are not in a position to fund all of those who requested aid. We hope future developments will allow us to fund a number of these students, but at this time, our funds are quite limited. Graduate students, please feel free to contact me to discuss your specific situation. I'm sorry we cannot do more at this time.

If you are planning to take a comprehensive exam this August, and you have not submitted your paperwork to Ann Marie, please do so as soon as possible.

Grad students, please don't wait until the last minute to register for courses. Though the start of the fall term is months away, we will need to make scheduling decisions about low-enrollment courses well before the start of classes. Don't let a class be cancelled because you waited too long to register.

The department would greatly appreciate receiving nominations for the Conley Dillon, Don C. Piper and Roger H. Davidson awards. See below for information about each of the awards.

The Dillon award is open to all and only graduate students in the Department of Government and Politics who have finished all course requirements, passed their comprehensive examinations and had their dissertation prospectus approved. Special preference will be given to students whose dissertation makes an original contribution to those fields and questions that occupied Professor Dillon throughout his career, in particular, intergovernmental relationships within the United States, American Government, or public policy in the U.S. In choosing a Dillon Award winner, the faculty committee will primarily consider the quality of work completed on the dissertation, but also take into consideration, teaching, other scholarship and public service. This award is in the amount of \$1000.

The Piper Award is given to a graduate student in the Department of Government and Politics at the University of Maryland at College Park for the best conference paper or journal article within the current academic year. This award is in the amount of \$200.

The Roger H. Davidson Award was created to honor one of the Department of Government and Politics' most distinguished faculty. It is to be awarded annually by the American politics faculty to the graduate student who writes the best paper in the field. The award consists of a check for \$500 and a citation that will be presented in a ceremony near the close of the academic year. In addition to overall quality, the Davidson Award Committee will give preference to papers written in Professor Davidson's fields of expertise. Preference will first be given to empirical (but not necessarily quantitative) papers on Congress and the Presidency, then to empirical papers focusing on American national political institutions in general, and then to empirical papers written about American politics more broadly. Note that this does not mean that papers on Congress and the Presidency automatically win. We encourage students to submit quality papers on a broad range of subjects within the American politics field.

Nominations and/or papers should be submitted to Ann Marie by April 15, 2011.
