This is a program for anyone concerned with the corrosive, often devastating impact of oppression, polarization, instability and violence on quality of life and development, in day-to-day local situations as well as in complex national and international conflicts. Join us for an intensive evening and weekend program of experiential learning and new perspectives on ways to resolve conflict and build a lasting peace.

The goal is **to develop the knowledge and skills needed to facilitate transformation of interpersonal, organizational, community or complex societal conflicts**, including ethnic, religious or cultural tensions, using techniques of multi-track and citizens' diplomacy. These techniques, applicable at all levels of society, provide an essential complement to official ("first track") diplomacy and police work, from conflicts in the workplace or community, to dealing with political instability, terrorism or insurgent activities, as currently in our work in the Middle East, South Asia, Latin America, Africa and elsewhere.

This year we will be using multi-track diplomacy to **search for common ground in one of the current conflicts in the Middle East Region** where CIDCM is engaged. A simulation between influential civil society representatives will be co-facilitated by experienced Israeli- and Muslim-American professionals, Prof. Edward (Edy) Kaufman, and Prof. John Davies (see below). In an effort to bridge the negotiation gap between parties that remain caught in cycles of violence and oppression, unofficial channels will be explored using leading-edge interactive techniques. New ideas and insights from the workshop, arrived at through trust building, skills building (in areas such as nonviolent communication,

prejudice reduction and integrative problem solving) and consensus building, will inform ongoing multi-track work in the region.

**Multi-track diplomacy** has become an important tool not only for diplomats, government and IO agencies and CSO staff working for development, democratic reform, relief and humanitarian aid, but also for other concerned citizens or stakeholders in areas of violence or instability. Offered at College Park by the Department of Government and Politics and sponsored by its Center for International Development & Conflict Management, this University of Maryland **80-hour winter training course** is scheduled for **evenings and two weekends** for the convenience of professionals (**certification available**).

## Instructors and Readings

Prof. Edy Kaufman and Prof. John Davies are Senior Associates with CIDCM, which has pioneered the development and application of multi-track diplomacy for resolving protracted ethnic, nationalist and other complex societal conflicts since the early 1980's. They are co-directors of CIDCM's *Partners in Conflict*, *Partners in Peacebuilding* and have collaborated in leading conflict transformation workshops in the Middle East, Latin America, Former Soviet Union, South Asia and Africa. Edy Kaufman has been Executive Director of the Truman Institute for the Advancement of Peace in Jerusalem. John Davies has also trained UN peacekeepers, and has helped build conflict early warning and response networks in the Caucasus, Africa and Asia. **Visiting speaker: Ambassador John McDonald**, Institute of Multi-Track Diplomacy.



## Certification and Scholarships

Successful completion qualifies participants for certification of advanced training, and 6 academic credits for degree seeking students. A small number of scholarships may be available covering up to half of the tuition costs for non-degree-seeking professionals, including embassy and CSO staff.

## Program Structure, Credit and Readings

The program may be taken either by non-degree-seeking professionals or by degree-seeking students as two 3-credit courses at either the 400 level or (with extra readings and written work) at the 800 (graduate) level.

**Schedule:** Twelve seminars: Mon-Fri evenings 6.00-9.15 pm, January 3-23, except Fri 6<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> classes as below, and Mon 16<sup>th</sup> Martin Luther King day ("snow days:" Jan. 21-22 if needed).

**Workshop in Citizens' Diplomacy** (GVPT 409K/808K or WINT 003)

**Schedule:** Two consecutive weekend workshops: Friday evenings 6-9pm, Saturday and Sundays 9am-1pm and 2-6pm, January 6-8 and 13-15 ("snow days:" Jan. 21-22 if needed).

**Those currently enrolled at other universities or colleges** who wish to receive academic credit must submit an admissions application before registering.
