Over the past five years, I have sponsored 40 Independent Study students, including eight who were awarded Senior Summer Scholarships. I have also directed 15 senior honors theses (four in AY02-03, and three in AY05-06). During this period, eight of my undergraduate students have been admitted to Ph.D programs in Political Science, and nine, to MA programs. In addition, three of my students were selected by the Dean of Undergraduate Programs to speak at the campus commencement, and one of them was the recipient of the university's 2003 award for Undergraduate Research, recognizing her academic record and the quality of her research project.

b. Course or Curriculum Development.

In the past seven years I have maintained a summer program in British Law, Politics and Society taught at Oxford University.

Oxford Summer Programme in British Law, Politics and Society:

In Summer and Fall of 2000, I worked with colleagues at Oxford University and with our Study Abroad Office to develop a course of study specifically for University of Maryland (primarily in GVPT) students to be delivered in July of each year by Oxford faculty members. The program offers an in-depth look at British law, politics, and society. During the three-week program (4 credits), students have the opportunity for concentrated study under the British tutorial system. Three course modules are offered: one required two-credit course in "Law and Society" and one two-credit course of the student's choosing. Students are sent reading lists in advance so that

they will arrive prepared to begin their studies. The courses are pre-approved, so there is no question about their applicability to a UMD degree. The programme was launched in Summer01, and it has proven to be a great success. Our eighth group of students will attend in July 2007.
