

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



Dr. H. Mebane Turner will be presented with the 2nd annual Lifetime Achievement Award at MAHE's Fall Conference on Friday, October 17.

Dr. H. Mebane Turner served with distinction as President of the University of Baltimore for 30 years. His achievements at the University include raising the standards and reputation of the university, its programs and increasing its visibility throughout the region. Under Dr. Turner's leadership and guidance, the University of Baltimore became an integral part of the city of Baltimore through the establishment of outreach programs in the social, legal, business and educational domains. Dr. Turner received his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and postgraduate degrees from Union Theological Seminary and Teachers College of Columbia University. He earned a Doctor of Education from The American University.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On campuses throughout the nation, the gentle quiet of summer slipped away. In its place, a flurry of activities and excitement is palpable. The quadrangles are once again crowded with students eagerly catching up with each other. In the classrooms, laboratories, studios, and sometimes under ancient shade trees, faculty members are sharing their knowledge with students. There are long lines of students outside the financial aid office waiting to see counselors about their scholarships, grants, or loans. Now and then, one sees bewildered-looking freshmen, campus maps in hand, desperately searching for the building where their classes are held. The near-empty parking lots of summer are but a memory. The academic year begins anew.

However, some students are missing from campus, those who have to skip a semester or two, or delay attending college because they first have to work for their tuition that has risen so phenomenally. The steep tuition hike is in large measure a result of deep cuts in state appropriations, victims of critical state budget crises. Some higher education leaders have called state budget cuts the "silent killer" of minority enrollment. A recent *Chronicle of Higher Education* article quoted Irving P. McPhail, chancellor of the Community College of Baltimore County, as saying, "We're trying to be careful to ensure that as we are making our decisions about program entrenchment, we are thinking about access." But he said, "In scaling back on remedial offerings" while preserving courses students need in order to transfer, "minority access will suffer at some point." This is sobering.

The Maryland Association for Higher Education holds its annual fall conference on October 17, 2003 at Villa Julie College. The conference theme is timely, *Living Through Budgetary Constraints*. It is my hope that many members of the higher education community would have an opportunity to attend and join in discussion with our panelists. **A History of Distinguished Programs

In 1982, the Maryland Association of Higher Education initiated the MAHE Distinguished Program Award to provide recognition of innovative and outstanding programs in Maryland higher education, and to facilitate communication about successful programs among individual and institutional members. Over time, an explicit set of eligibility and evaluation criteria were developed. Institutions submit applications for the Distinguished Program Awards, using an application form which asks about the nature of the programs, the population served, program implementation, effectiveness as measured by formal assessment methods, quality as documented in letters in support of the application, and overall contribution to higher education. Each year the MAHE president appoints a Distinguished Program Award Committee, which solicits, receives, and reviews program applications, and makes recommendations to the MAHE Executive Board. In most years the Committee has solicited awards in categories, typically instruction, student services, community service, plus an open category for programs not easily fitting in to the three specified. In addition to selecting winner(s) each year, the Committee sometimes recommends program for honorable mention or awards of merit. The committee does not always recommend awards in all categories every year.

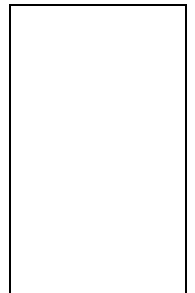
Including honorable mentions and awards of merit, a total of 94 Distinguished Program Awards have been granted since MAHE began the awards in 1982. Twenty-five different institutions have been honored. Prince Georges's Community College has won the most awards totaling 16. There are many multiple award winners.
