The department offers a Bachelor of Arts degree with two highly-regarded options: a cultural and social analysis concentration with traditional liberal arts training aimed at exploring the culture and history of African-Americans; or the public policy concentration with an emphasis on problem-solving, analytical decision-making and practical applications of policy analysis and management skills.

**ANTHROPOLOGY**

Anthropology is the science of the biological evolution of human species and the disciplined scholarship of the cultural development of human beings' knowledge and customary behavior. It is the study of culture and seeks to understand humans as a whole - as social beings who are capable of symbolic communication through which they produce a rich cultural record. Undergraduate majors have the option of concentrating in one of three subfields or maintaining a general anthropology focus. The subfields are archaeology, biological anthropology and cultural anthropology.

The undergraduate program in economics is designed to help students understand the methods of analysis typically used in the discipline as well as knowledge of the American economic system and our country's economic relations with the rest of the world. Students analyze economic forces that determine the production of goods and services, the level of prices, the distribution of income and other economic factors that influence the quality of life. The program of study includes empirical and analytical techniques as well as opportunities to focus on policy issues and current economic problems.

**GEOGRAPHY**

Geography concerns the relations between people and the natural world, the effects of ecosystems on human beings and vice versa, the choices people make, the effects of past actions on people today, and the effects of today's choices on future generations. Students specializing in geography will be exposed to a diversity of coursework that focuses on human-environmental interactions, and will develop an area of concentration in geography such as urban geography or biogeography. The Bachelor of Science degree program in geography with a specialization in geographic information science and computer cartography is designed to give students the technical skills needed to acquire, manage and analyze large amounts of geographic data.

The Department of Government and Politics combines philosophical and scientific concerns in its overall program as well as in specific courses. Government and politics is the study of power, power relations and social justice. The department is organized into subfields in which undergraduates can focus their coursework. These subfields include: American politics, comparative politics, political theory, international relations, political economy, public law and political behavior.

**SOCIOLOGY**

Sociology is the scientific study of society and its institutions, organizations and groups. By observing the broad range of activities in society and exploring topics such as social class, race, gender, deviance, family, religion, the work place and demographic trends, sociologists provide important information and perspectives on our social order and the causes and impacts of social change. The undergraduate sociology program offers four areas of specialization: social psychology; family and demography; social organizations; and social stratification.

**HEARING & SPEECH SCIENCES**

Hearing and speech sciences is an inherently interdisciplinary field, integrating knowledge from the physical and biological sciences, medicine, psychology, linguistics and education in order to understand human communication and its disorders. An undergraduate major in this field is an appropriate background for graduate training in speech-language pathology or audiology, as well as for graduate work in other disciplines requiring knowledge of normal or disordered speech, language or hearing. The student who wishes to work professionally as a speech-language pathologist or audiologist must obtain a graduate degree in order to meet national certification requirements and most state licensure laws.

**PSYCHOLOGY**

Psychology is a remarkably broad field that studies mind and behavior at all levels of analysis ranging from the micro to the macro; from single cells to complex systems; from individuals to groups and cultures; and from invertebrates to humans. Some of these endeavors connect with the biological sciences and others with the social sciences. The undergraduate major in psychology provides an introduction to the methods by which the behavior of humans and other organisms are studied, and to the biological conditions and social factors that influence behavior. The program emphasizes a strong foundation in quantitative and research methods. Students who wish to pursue graduate study in psychology or related professional schools will have opportunities to participate in research.
